
BURLEIGH HILL . GOLD COAST





comprehensive collection of 1960s glassware and modernist Danish furniture was a starting point for the renovation of this northfacing house on Burleigh Hill, Gold Coast. Husband-and-wife architect team Angela and Mark Jamison not only added a new floor to the existing 1980s duplex, but also designed plenty of display cabinets and niches to best exhibit the owners' collections.

"The former design didn't take advantage of either the view or the climate," says Mark Jamison, so the architects added a top-floor master suite with a sunken lounge and balcony. The bedroom and bathroom can be separated from the lounge and balcony as desired by concealed sliding doors. The new level allows the empty-nester

owners a private retreat when adult children visit, and serves as a secondary entertaining space.


A sloping roof was removed and extra space devoted to the main living area. The ceiling height of the main living space was increased, and a wall of sashless windows creates the feeling of sitting on the edge of the view in the lounge room. A filigree aluminium screen can slide across the glass to filter sunlight and increase privacy, its pattern a reference to the wellloved and well-used '60s breeze blocks all around the Gold Coast.

Existing timber floors were restored and stones used as feature walls. With one owner a renderer, much thought was put into creating a concrete-look finish for the exterior fibrous cement sheeting, giving the house a solid and contemporary appearance.

Hold fossils millions of years old. Touch skeletons that are even older. And see dinosaur footprints frozen in time. Here's a great 4 day adventure agenda for all the dinosaur experience you can handle in Outback Queensland.

DAY 1 Near Winton (2hrs - 110km)

Venture south-west of Winton to the Dinosaur Stampede at Lark Quarry Conservation Park and discover the world's first evidence of a dinosaur stampede. Stay at the North Gregory Hotel where Waltzing Matilda was first performed.

DAY 2 Winton

Hit the Australian Age of Dinosaurs Museum where you can look out across the endless flat bed of an ancient inland sea. Take an interpretive tour at the museum, see life size dinosaur replicas and learn all about the transition from living creatures to ancient fossils.

DAY 3 Winton - Hughenden (2.5hrs - 216km)

Travel to Hughenden to visit the Flinders Discovery Centre for photos with Hughie the Muttaburrasaurus. See the fossil exhibition or head to Porcupine Gorge, known locally as Australia's little Grand Canyon. As for accommodation, Hughenden's Royal Hotel is a good place to stay.

DAY 4 Hughenden - Richmond (1.25hrs - 116km)

Check out the Kronosaurus Korner Museum and Visitor Information Centre for a fossicker's guide and dirt-map to find the best belemnites (similar to squid) and fish teeth—your very own fossil treasures.
